






## **CHIWOS** updates: Baseline

# Average age of participants is 43 ranging from 16 to 74






**Fig 1**: Current and upcoming CHIWOS sites with target and actual recruitment numbers.

- Completed **1,252** (of 1,422) Wave 2 interviews
- National retention rate = 88 %





# Purpose of Mâmawi Wâhkôhtowin

- Day-long arts-based data collection event based around Medicine Wheel.
- First day on June 5, 2017, follow up feast on June 27, 2017
- Means "community relations" in Cree, provided through ceremony by our Knowledge Keeper.
- Aim of the day:
  - How Indigenous women living with HIV define wellness/health
  - Barriers they face in reaching those goals
  - Experiences in accessing services

Wahkohtowin is a Cree word which refers to the concept of kinship or, the state of being connected.



### M $\widehat{a}$ mawi W $\widehat{a}$ hk $\widehat{o}$ htowin

- 6 woman-identified people living with HIV participated.
- Four quadrants: physical, emotional, mental, spiritual
- Participants included words, images, drawings that represented their experiences/definitions
- Day also included: ceremony, drumming, access to a healer for one-on-one treatments, feast, and debriefing.
- The group met three weeks later to feast the quilt and share about the process





Black: Spiritual

Yellow: Emotional



White: Mental

Red: Physical




#### **General Results**

- Wellness was described as:
  - communicating with and listening to others
  - learning from Elders
  - walking
  - being out with family
- Barriers to wellness include:
  - complex trauma
  - flawed systems
  - challenges to disclosing in relationships
  - violence from men



Background: Women comprise nearly one-quarter of people living with human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) in Canada. Compared with men, women living with HIV experience inequities in HIV care and health outcomes, prompting a need for gendered and tailored approaches to HIV care.

Method: Peer and academic researchers from the Canadian HIV Women's Sexual and Reproductive Health Cohort Study conducted focus groups to understand women's experience of seeking care, with the purpose of identifying key characteristics that define a women-centered approach to HIV care. Eleven focus groups were conducted with 77 women living with HIV across Quebec Ontario, and British Columbia Canada

Results: Women envisioned three central characteristics of women-centered HIV care, including i) coordinated and integrated services that address both HIV and women's health care priorities, and protect against exclusion from care due to HIV-related stigma, ii) care that recognizes and responds to structural barriers that limit women's access to care, such as violence, poverty, motherhood, HIV-related stigma, and challenges to safe disclosure, and iii) care that fosters peer support and peer leadership in its design and delivery to honor the diversity of women's experiences, overcome women's isolation, and prioritize women's ownership over the decisions that affect their lives.

Conclusion: Despite advances in HIV treatment and care, the current care landscape is inadequate to meet women's ensive care needs. A women-centered approach to HIV care, as envisioned by women living with HIV, is central to guiding policy and practice to improve care and outcomes for women living with HIV in Canada.




